Motion to adopt by acclamation: Approving a draft resolution without a vote, showing unanimous consent.

- 1. Raised after debate ends Usually after the closure of debate on a draft resolution.
- 2. Proposed by a delegate The delegate says something like: "Motion to adopt the draft resolution by acclamation."
- 3. Chair asks for objections If no delegate objects, the resolution is adopted unanimously.
- 4. If someone objects The motion fails, and the resolution goes to a formal vote.

Motion to move to previous question: granted or denied, "We will_____"

Unmoderated Caucus: An informal session where delegates move freely and engage in open discussion or negotiation without chair moderation

Moderated Caucus: A structured debate format where delegates speak one at a time for a set

When no one is	General debate: call on someone who has not spoken yet (consult
speaking	COS list)
	Open debate: see above OR call on a co-submitter
	Closed: call on someone who should be for/against (depending on
	which debate you are in)
	Force people to take at least one point of information
	Remind delegates of the necessity of their involvement
	• In general, try to keep a balance between fun and seriousness so
	delegates stay focused when needed and don't get bored
Trolls	Stay calm; don't yell or become hysterical
	Remind them that you are in charge
	Don't take yourself too seriously
	Report to Execs if Issue persists.
When you have	At the end of the day: Punishments or a game
nothing to do	Throughout the day: Call a recess
	At the end of committee session (Sat/Sun afternoon): awards, etc.
	Mock debate (if you have finished all resolutions)
